We began in 2020 as a fully online initiative, with few members who had ever met in person. Over the last two years, we witnessed the Black In Neuro community grow, representing more institutions and countries around the world. While we remain committed to the safety and accessibility of free, virtual events, we began hosting some in-person gatherings at lectures and conferences.

With hard work and dedication, we became a registered 501(c)(3) non-profit organization, launched our Black In Neuro store, began several exciting new initiatives, developed our advisory board, and grew our team. We cheered on our community, including several of our own volunteer team members, as they published manuscripts, presented posters, graduated, started the first year of their graduate or residency programs, and began their postdoctoral, faculty, and industry careers.

Appreciate that the event is free & open to all. Congratulations on this amazing year!


"Everything"



We are constantly learning from our past events and solicit feedback to better meet the needs of our community. Thank you to all of you for tweeting, emailing, and filling out surveys so that Black In Neuro can better serve you. Based on your input, some initiatives that we are looking forward to launching are the pilot year of our Black In Neuro Mentorship Program and our first, pilot Black In Neuro Chapter: Black In Neuro Manhattan.



At Black In Neuro we believe that mentorship is vital, not only for the success but retention of Black scholars. Our pilot year will begin with a mainly virtual program and a small cohort of mentees at the undergraduate, graduate, and postdoctoral career levels. They will be paired with mentors who will undergo culturally-competent mentorship training. Mentees will get guidance and feedback on their career, future plans, and goals. Over the year mentor and mentee pairs will have the opportunity to participate in a range of exclusive professional development workshops.



We are also moving towards having a physical presence in localized geographic regions. Black In Neuro Manhattan will provide the blueprint for subsequent chapters in regions across the globe. We encourage you to express interest into starting a local chapter, and we will be in touch once we develop a cohesive, sustainable process for Black scholars to find community in their local areas.


Do you have any ideas for future events you'd like to see?

How to navigate large conferences like SfN; Improving presentation skills

Targeted events for bridging gaps and catching folks who might be slipping out of the field due to lack of information, guidance, and opportunity. For example, undergraduate focused events to discuss the importance of mentorship, research, and how it is never 'too late' (highlighting REU's etc). Or bridging the gap between undergraduate and masters, masters and doctoral, etc.

One thing I have always wanted to do is have a space to talk about social and racial justice but just with Black people. So often the book clubs, racial justice events, etc are centering white or non-Black people's comfort or education and there isn't a space for us to discuss or talk about these things together. I saw just one or two times where there were things said by panelists which I didn't necessarily agree with. This isn't a bad thing at all and it could just be my opinion, but as someone who reads a lot of Black Feminist work and is really interested in Black Queer, Trans, Disabled, etc. issues, I feel like it is so important for our community to be educated about these topics too and not unintentionally say harmful things or say something questionable to a wider (non-Black) audience.
